MATCHING GIFT PROGRAMS MAY ALLOW EMPLOYEES AND RETIREES TO DOUBLE THEIR FINANCIAL GIFT TO SUPPORT TDV

As you consider a gift to support Therapy Dogs of Vermont this year, please be mindful that a growing number of employers in the region are now making their donation decisions based upon organizations important to their employees and retirees.

We respectfully encourage you to please check with your employer to see if they have a matching gift program. Such programs may provide a wonderful way to increase the size of your financial gift to TDV. Some employers will even match volunteer hours with dollars! Below are just a few examples.

IBM will match a contribution to TDV up to \$5,000 for employees --- part-time, full-time, and Retirees. Here is a link for the information and the form you can use for IBM (http://doublethedonation.com/matching-gifts/ibm-international-business-machines)

Green Mountain Coffee Roasters has a program titled, "Dollars-4-Doers" which recognizes employees who volunteer at least 25 hours (outside of normal work time) to TDV. GMCR contributes \$250 to that on the employee's behalf. They also match individual employee donations to TDV at 100% (up to \$1,000 per fiscal year).

Northfield Savings Bank provides 10% of its profits to Vermont community organizations with grants to not-for-profit organizations like TDV. NSB also offers a 100% matching donation of up to \$1,000 per employee, per year to TDV.

Please recognize these are only just a few of the many companies of all sizes which have matching gift programs so please inquire. If your company does not have such a program, speak to your employer about having them establish one. I would be happy to help you and your employer in such an effort. By the way, to complete matching gift forms (or to set up such a program) it is important to note that TDV has been designated by the IRS as a 501 (c) 3 taxexempt organization since 1998 and that TDV's Employer Identification Number is 03-0334205.

From the age of eight weeks, she shared an office with her owner, MarthaLeah Chaiken, at Hofstra University, where Coco quickly became hooked on attention and pats from a diverse population of students, faculty, and staff. She took group classes in basic obedience and passed her Canine Good Citizen test at the age of one year. Since she loved the classes, she went on to pass the test twice more just for fun.

The director of Hofstra's Diagnostic and Research Institute for Autism Spectrum Disorders asked Coco and Martha to participate in weekly desensitization sessions for one of their clients, who was terrified of dogs. The treatment was a success, and Coco had found her calling.

Coco joined TDV in 2009. The toughest part of the test for her was to resist an invitation to jump up on the tester. Since then she has been the reading dog at Kellogg-Hubbard library.

Coco's owner has a PhD from the Institute of Animal Behavior at Rutgers University, but she can't claim credit for Coco's beautiful disposition, as Coco's predecessor, a Welsh terrier, routinely engaged in snarling matches with Martha's mother.
